Welcome

Welcome to the Cherryland Middle School Band Program! It is with great excitement and enthusiasm that I introduce our middle school band program to you in a more detailed manner. Our band program has the foundations for excellence and I am glad that you have chosen to be a part of it.

Your student's participation in our band program is beneficial in numerous ways. Band students are engaged daily in a highly creative performing art that stimulates growth in areas of the human brain that no other discipline can. This growth transfers over to your student's academic life and develops the skills they need beyond middle school. Those skills include teamwork, responsibility, dedication, self-discipline, social skills, confidence, leadership, and dependability. Being a member of our middle school band program will give a sense of accomplishment, pride, and respect as the students develop musical and personal skills that will enrich their lives.

The purpose of this handbook is to not overwhelm you with a multitude of details. It is to provide you with specific information and educate all parties involved, the student and parents. This handbook is an outline of the guidelines and expectations for making this school year a success for all involved. Please have you and your student carefully read this handbook and upon completion, please return the last page, signed and returned to school, indicating that you and your student understand these guidelines and expectations.

Enrolling in band is a full year course, and students who enroll are expected to commit for the full academic school year.

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Communication

Communication is key to keep our students and parents “in-the-know” of what is happening in our band program. Here are some communication platforms that is used in our band program:

1. **Email:** Every week I send out a parent email that contains announcements for concerts, fundraisers, upcoming events, etc. To receive these emails, please check that you have the correct email on file through PowerSchool.
2. **Remind:** The Remind App is a great tool to reach a large group of people through texting. This is an app that you can download from the App Store or Google Play Store. This is the best method of reaching out to parents in case of last minute changes in concerts, reminders to turn in forms, etc. You can sign up to get notifications through your mobile phone and email. The best part is that it won't charge and texting fees through your cell phone service provider.
3. **Facebook:** please “LIKE” our Facebook page! Search for **Elk Rapids Bands** and this is another platform we use to get any reminders out, announcements, last minute changes, etc. Also, pictures of concerts and other Elk Rapids Band activities are also posted on here.

Student Communication

For our band students, I will use email and will also use Google Classroom. Around the beginning of the school year, the students will be able to sign-up to their Google Classroom and this is where I will post announcements, homework assignments, educational videos, etc. Students should have the Google Classroom notification setting turned ON to get these announcements.

Throughout the year, there will be quite a bit of information being sent home, whether it is through online or hard copies that your student brings home. Please make every effort to read this information carefully, check calendars often and please keep me informed of any conflicts. The sooner I know of a situation, the more options I have to find an acceptable solution.

Classroom Expectations

Band students will observe all procedures set by Cherryland Middle School and Elk Rapids Public Schools. In addition to the following, as they pertain to the instrumental music setting:

- Any behavior which is not representative of good citizenship, as perceived by the band director, may result in the student's dismissal from the activity at hand as well as the band program. This also applies to the actions of student leaders in both public and private events.
- All students are expected to conduct themselves in accordance with the Positivity Project. Individual behavior during a band function is a reflection of the group.
- Students will follow directors' instructions.
- Students will be in their assigned rehearsal space with all necessary equipment at the beginning of rehearsal time.
- Students will keep their hands and feet to themselves.
- Students will not use or play on equipment they do not own without permission from a director.
- Students will not touch, handle, borrow, or use anyone else's instrument, uniform, or personal belongings.

- Students should request permission to speak by raising their hand and waiting to be acknowledged. All rehearsals are expected to be extremely quiet so that time will be utilized as wisely and efficiently as possible.
- When allowed in the band room, either before or after school, students will not disturb any rehearsal in progress.
- Students will respect the property of others, and return their equipment to its proper storage place when not in use. Students should keep their equipment in the designated storage area, and keep said storage area clean and neat in appearance. Students who have difficulty with this may lose the privilege of having a storage area in the band room.
- Students will not deface or mark on instruments, music stands, chairs, walls, etc.
- Students will not write on the dry-erase boards without permission from the director.

Digital Citizenship

Maintaining a higher standard of conduct will also include ensuring that band member websites (Google Classroom) and communication on social media are appropriate. The internet is a worldwide, publicly accessible form of communication. Any communication appearing on the internet is public domain, even if it is marked private. Students are to abide by the digital guidelines and policies set by Cherryland Middle School and Elk Rapids Public Schools.

Financial Obligations

There are materials that band students and their families will be financially obligated. This includes reeds, mutes, percussion sticks and mallets, folders, tuner/metronome (KORG TM-60 or TM-50), contact microphone (CM-200 or CM-300), etc.

A more specific list will be sent to parents before the first day of school and during the first week of school.

It is the philosophy of the entire Elk Rapids Band Program that no student should be denied the privilege of being a member of our band program due to financial hardship. For options in meeting financial obligations, parents should contact the band director.

Fundraising

Fundraising is one of the main backbones of our band program. We have several fundraisers planned during the school year and even though participation is not required it is highly encouraged. Fundraisers help our program purchase instruments, supplies, equipment, help pay for trips, etc. Due to budget limitations, this is a necessity for the survival of our band program.

Below are some fundraisers that we do every year:

- Band Apparel
- Poinsettia Sale
- Concession sales from hosting the MSBOA District 2 Band & Orchestra Festival

Any money that is raised for the Elk Rapids Band Program cannot be refunded to a student. If a student raises money and is unable to attend a trip for any reason, the money the student raised becomes property of the Elk Band Booster Account.

If a student leaves the Elk Rapids Band Program, all money remains in the Elk Rapids Band Booster Account.

Donations are accepted to help our band program. Any funds that are donated to the Elk Rapids Band Program can go towards equipment, new instruments, music, setting up financial need for families, unforeseen expenses that may occur, etc.

Care of Facilities

These are the expectations and guidelines that all CMS Band students must follow:

- ❖ No gum, food, or drinks (except water) are allowed in the band room except when authorized by the director.
- ❖ All trash is to be deposited in the wastebaskets provided.
- ❖ Acts of vandalism or the willful misuse of school property will be dealt with severely and appropriately. Every band member is responsible to help the director monitor the facility and control vandalism, which includes but is not limited to writing or carving on walls, destroying music, damaging instruments, or breaking school property.
- ❖ Absolutely no student is allowed in the practice rooms without permission.
- ❖ Please knock on the office door; and, if you are invited in, you may enter. Otherwise, offices are off-limits to students.

- ❖ The telephone in the band room may not be used by students. This phone is not to be used for calls by students; if a student needs to make a phone call, they can do so at the main office with permission from the director.
- ❖ Students are not allowed to use any of the band room technology without permission from the director. This includes the iPad/laptop, stereo system, electronic keyboard, projector, etc. Failure to do so will be dealt with severely and appropriately.

Attendance

In order to have and maintain a high-quality band program, each member's attendance is essential. While the CMS Band Program follows all school and district policies and procedures, the following additional guidelines outline the attendance procedures and policies for the CMS Band Program. These attendance guidelines also apply to activities held outside of the school day.

Excused Absence: Absences during the school day will be excused according to district guidelines. **Absences from activities held outside the school day will be excused at the discretion of the director.** Appointments, tutorials, etc. are not excuses for absence. Absences due to personal illness requiring medical attention, death in the family, or other extenuating circumstances (approved by the director) may be considered for excused status. Students who are continually ill may be required to provide a doctor's note releasing them from participation. Absences should be discussed with the director to determine whether or not they will be excused.

Unexcused Absence: An unexcused absence from any required band activity will receive a zero in the grade book and will drop the overall grade by two letters. If a student misses two or more required band activities, there is a strong possibility that the student will no longer be enrolled as a band student.

Concerts/Performances: Concerts and performances are an integral component of the band curriculum. Students should consult their band calendars for dates and times. Each of the concert ensembles will perform at various times throughout the school year and are mandatory. Periodically, the schedule may change and updates will be communicated. Concerts are considered to have three parts: warm-up, performance, and listening. For the student, the concert begins at the warm-up. Punctuality is essential. A concert concludes after the last group has performed and directors give permission for students to be dismissed. A general report time will be given for all

students. If a performance causes a student to miss another class, the student is responsible to make up all missed work.

Performances during the school year include, but not limited to:

- Winter Concert
- MSBOA District 2 Band and Orchestra Festival
- Cherryland Middle School Student Showcase
- Cherryland Middle School Solo Festival
- Spring Concert

Daily Supplies

Each student should plan to bring the following items to rehearsal and/or performances. Other items may be added at the discretion of the director.

- All issued music
- Tradition of Excellence Book 1 (6th Grade)
- Tradition of Excellence Technique and Musicianship (7th and 8th Grade)
- Pencil
- Instrument (with case and name tag)
- All supplies relative to their instrument
- Korg TM-50 or Korg TM-60 metronome/tuner
- Korg Contact Microphone Pickup
- Other supplies as needed, such as reeds, valve oil, slide grease, etc.

Grading Guidelines

Assignments, quizzes, tests, classroom activities, and other instructional activities are designed so that the student's performance indicates the level of mastery of the instructional objectives. The student's mastery level of these objectives is a major factor in determining the grade for a subject or course.

6th Grade Grading Guidelines:

Once the due date has passed on an assignment and the student did not turn it in on the day that it was due, it will be marked as a **zero (0)** in the grade book via PowerSchool and/or Google Classroom until it is turned in. Students can submit late assignments, but he/she will receive a 20% reduction each day that the assignment is late. After five days, if the assignment has not been turned in, it will be a permanent **zero (0)** in the grade book via PowerSchool. A student who has an excused absence on the day of an assignment that is assigned, they will be allowed to have however many extra days they were absent. If a student is absent on the day an assignment is due, then they can turn it in the next day they return to school.

The following list is provided to give students and parents examples of items that may be subject to grading. Additional assignments may be given at the discretion of the director.

- The student will be on task and focused during rehearsals.
- The student will have their instrument, music, pencil, and supplies in rehearsals.
- The student will be prepared to pay his/her part with confidence.
- The student will make music and take notes as needed.
- The student will be expected to improve individual music skills.
- The student's individual skill development will be evaluated through recorded video assignments, playing quizzes, playing tests, and/or written tests.
- The student will be evaluated on improvement of ensemble skills during daily rehearsals.
- The student will be expected to improve his/her performance fundamentals.
- The student will be evaluated for improvement of his/her music fundamentals through daily observation during the "basics" part of each rehearsal and during sectionals.
- The student will be expected to demonstrate correct posture, hand position, embouchure, air production, and articulation as monitored during rehearsals.
- The student will be expected to develop a historical knowledge of the literature relative to their respective instrument.
- The student will receive a grade for each performance during a grading period.

District Owned-Instruments

Elk Rapids Public Schools provide a very limited amount of instruments for student use. These include a wide variety of wind instruments and general percussion equipment. This equipment is generally purchased by the school district for student use because of its expense. Thus, all district-owned equipment must be handled with care. Students failing to take proper care of their district-owned instruments may lose the privilege of using such instruments. The following is a list of general procedures for district-owned instruments:

- If possible, students who play large instruments and are dependent upon Elk Rapids Public Schools buses may be issued one instrument for home use and one for school use. This will be at the discretion of the director and will be based on instrument availability and transportation needs.
- Elk Rapids Public Schools does not provide insurance for individually owned or district-owned equipment. All students utilizing district-owned instruments are required to provide insurance coverage for the instruments that have been issued

to them. Students will be held responsible for damage caused to all district-owned instruments issued to them. Students and parents must sign an instrument checkout form before the student can use an instrument.

- Each instrument will be issued in good playing condition. Students are expected to maintain their issued instruments accordingly.
- The band member is financially responsible for all equipment and/or materials check out to him or her.
- All equipment and materials must be kept in their proper storage location when not in use.
- District-owned instruments should not be taken outside of the United States.

Special Note - District-owned instruments are not to be treated as “free” instruments. **Basic supplies must still be purchased and repairs must still be made.** Please treat these instruments as if they were your own. Most district-owned instruments exceed \$2,000 in value.

Instrument Storage and Identification

Instrument storage areas are to be used for instrument storage ONLY!! With the limited space, not every student will have their own space. The storage area must be kept clean. Instruments are to be put in their cases, and the cases kept closed and latched while in the storage area. **NO INSTRUMENTS SHOULD BE KEPT IN STORAGE AREAS OVERNIGHT OR OVER THE WEEKENDS.**

It is highly recommended that all personal instruments have the proper insurance coverage. Instruments ARE NOT insured by Elk Rapids Public Schools.

Band students will take home their instruments and band folders every evening. Students are expected to practice regularly outside of band class and private lessons.

Students are not allowed to leave their instrument unattended at any time. There will be consequences for any student whose instrument is brought to us by another student, teacher, etc. -- whether it is found on or off school property.

Uniform Guidelines

Ladies:

 - Shoulders should be covered and straps no smaller than three fingers width

- Flats or low heeled-shoes
 - No flip-flops
 - No open-toed shoes
 - No sneakers
 - No boots
- Colored jewelry and make-up should be minimal and not distracting
- Sunglass or headgear are not to be worn
- 7th Grade and 8th Grade**
 - Black dress pants or skirt
 - Skirt must reach at the knees or below
 - Black tights or leggings are to be worn underneath
 - White tuxedo shirt (to be assigned)
 - Plain white shirt underneath - writing or color will show under the stage lights
 - Black bow tie (to be assigned)
 - Black flats or low heels
 - No flip-flops
 - No open-toed shoes
 - No sneakers
 - No boots
 - Colored jewelry and make-up should be minimal and not distracting
 - Sunglass or headgear are not to be worn

Gentlemen:

- 6th Grade**
 - Solid color or minimal pattern dress shirt
 - Polo shirt or button-down shirt
 - Solid khaki, dark grey, charcoal, or black dress pants
 - Plain white shirt underneath
 - Ties are optional - solid color only
 - Must wear a belt (brown or black)
 - LONG BLACK SOCKS ARE REQUIRED!!!

- Dress shoes (brown or black)
 - No flip-flops
 - No open-toed shoes
 - No sneakers
 - No boots
- Colored jewelry and make-up should be minimal and not distracting
- Sunglass or headgear are not to be worn
- 7th and 8th Grade**
 - Black dress pants
 - No jeans
 - No athletic pants
 - No sweatpants
 - Black dress belt
 - LONG BLACK SOCKS ARE REQUIRED!!!

 - Plain white shirt underneath - writing or color will show under the stage lights
 - Black bow tie (to be assigned)

Concerts/Performances

Concerts and performances are frequent with all bands. Students should consult their calendars for dates and times. Periodically, the schedule will change and updates will be sent home and posted on the Elk Rapids Band Facebook page.

- ❖ Concerts are considered to have three parts: warm-up, performance, and listening.
- ❖ The concert begins for the student at the warm-up. **Punctuality is essential!!** A concert concludes when the last group performs and directors have given permission for students to be dismissed. A general report time will be given for all students.
- ❖ All concerts are a group effort; thus, **ATTENDANCE IS REQUIRED!!!**

- ❖ All concerts are an extension of the classroom and will be graded accordingly.
- ❖ Students should be punctual and prepared for each performance/concert.
- ❖ In the event a performance causes a student to miss another class, the student is responsible to make up all missed work!
- ❖ The appropriate dress for all concerts will be a dress uniform (see Uniform Guidelines).

Concert Behavior Expectations

Band students will exhibit proper concert behavior during all performances, in either their own band or as an audience member. Students will be graded on their behavior. Concert etiquette is an integral part of music education.

The following rules will be followed by parents and students at all times:

- Talking is not permitted on stage or in the audience. It is disrespectful to the performers on stage and audience members.
- Do not distract the performing band in any way.
- Move between the seating area and stage in quiet, single-file lines. Sit in your assigned seat/row. Do not talk as you enter or exit.
- Do not leave your seat for any reason during a performance. You will be given ample time to use the restroom and drinking fountain before a concert begins. If you must leave, do so as quietly and inconspicuously as possible (make sure the doors do not slam shut). Leave between songs only.
- No food or drink is allowed on stage, backstage, or in the seating area (except water).
- Cell phones must be turned off or on airplane-mode and stowed away. Any student using a cell phone during a performance may have consequences.
- Support your fellow band members with appropriate applause. Yelling, whistling, shouting names, etc. is not acceptable.
- Set a good example for the audience and other students. Other people may not know how to behave in a concert setting.
- We hope all parents and guests will stay for the concert when bringing a student to a concert. If a student needs to be picked up, please do so in a timely manner. Any student not picked up on time may not be allowed to participate in future CMS Band activities.
- Students are required to stay for the entire concert.

MSBOA Band & Orchestra Festival

Participation in the MSBOA District 2 Band & Orchestra Festival is mandatory for all 8th grade band students and potentially 7th grade band students (based on needed-instrumentation).

Elk Rapids High School is a host-site for the Festival and the event tends to be on the last Friday-Saturday in February and the first Friday-Saturday in March. This is one of our biggest performances of the school year - it is equivalent to our school-wide standardized testing like the M-STEP, PSAT, etc.

Travel Guidelines

The bands will occasionally travel on school busses during the school year. Students are expected to conduct themselves at the highest level on any trip. They are ambassadors of our band program, school, and community.

Students who have been subject to school-level discipline in the course of the school year may be deemed ineligible to participate in non-MSBOA trips, at the discretion of the director and/or school administration.

Students must travel to events and return from events on the bus. Any student wishing to arrive or leave with his/her parent(s) must notify the director in writing with parent signature, prior to the event. Permission will be granted or denied based on the circumstances of the occasion.

Students must have all necessary forms (Medical/Permission Slips) completed and on file with the main office to travel on any trip with the band.

While on the bus, students will:

- Remain seated at all times.
- Keep the bus clear of food, drinks, and debris.
- Keep all body parts inside the bus.
- Use only approved type/headset radios (no audible speakers).
- Remain silent when addressed by an adult on the bus.
- Refrain from loud, boisterous talking, singing, screaming, whistling, inappropriate jokes, etc.
- No public displays of affection

Chaperones:

Adult chaperones must pass a background check through Elk Rapids Public Schools and need to provide a date of birth and full legal name with maiden name (if applicable). Proper respect will be shown to all adults at all times. If your parent(s) is interested in serving as a chaperone, please contact the band director.

Solo Festival

All band members will prepare and perform a solo piece and this event will occur at the beginning of May at Cherryland Middle School. The solo will be provided by the band director around the beginning of the second semester.

Grades are based on an overall performance - to be given by an adjudicator who is a current/retired band director or professional musician.

Safety

Due to having our main performance space at Elk Rapids High School, the students will need to walk to the high school for some rehearsals. Students are to walk together as a group and obey all traffic signs and laws. Students are to walk the hallways with absolutely no talking and to keep on the right side of the hallway. Failure to do this could jeopardize the student in participating in the concert.

Parent Drop-off and Pick-up

Parents must make arrangements for transportation of their children to and from section rehearsals, and to and from the band hall during trips and special events. Lack of transportation will not be an accepted excuse for missing a band function. To ensure the safety of their children, parents are encouraged to have a plan for drop-off and pick-up of students in a timely manner for band events.

For the safety of all involved, students must go home after the band hall closes. Parents, please be aware that the main office may be closed when you drop-off or pick-up your students. Family transportation and car pools are ways to help your child get home safely and in a timely manner.

Band Boosters

The Elk Rapids Band Program is proud to have a Band Booster program and are extremely appreciative of all that they do for our band students. Our program needs more band parents to be involved with our Booster program - no matter what capacity. Some areas of need are chaperoning trips, volunteering at Band and Orchestra Festival, uniform fitting, etc. On the form at the back of the handbook, please indicate that you would like to help the band program.

Dental Work/Braces

Due to the nature of performance, your child's participation (or lack thereof) can have a significant impact on the overall success of the other students in their band or ensemble. When it comes to braces and dental work, please contact a director in advance and take into account the band calendar and performance obligations. Optimal times for braces and dental work would be the beginning of summer.
